Historic Preservation at the State Level
• California Environmental Quality Act • California Register of Historical Resources • All National Register of Historic Places designations are automatically on the California Register (even if only formally determined eligible) • California Historical Landmarks (often only sites) • State Historic Resources Commission • State Historical Resources Inventory • (BERD) Build Environment Resource Directory

State Density Bonus – Historic Resource Case Study
A city or county can deny a requested housing incentive, concession, or waiver under State Density Bonus if it finds based on substantial evidence that the request would cause a specific, adverse impact on an historic resource, defined as a resource listed in the California Register of Historical Resources – Not necessarily a locally designed landmark.
